This is testament to our Year 3 and 5 teachers who, while preparing students for testing, have understood the importance of a balanced approach. As one of the first online schools in the state, students had the opportunity to undertake engaging, tailored tests on the laptops. A big thank you to Lauren Osborne who coordinated the testing and provided effective IT support and troubleshooting.

We have a busy week coming up with afterschool events. Thank you to Brett Morellini, who has organised two parent sessions this week. The first is a family evening in conjunction with the Alcoa Maths Enrichment Program which students are participating in. As mentioned in the last newsletter, we have planned an exciting evening of maths activities to enjoy with your children. You will be provided with a handbook containing ideas on how to talk maths with your kids at home and several games you can play with cards and dice. You will then be invited to participate in a Maths Murder Mystery, solving many fun maths puzzles to ultimately catch the culprit! It can take from 20 to 80 minutes to solve. This week, the students enjoyed participating in *the* **National Simultaneous Storytime** event, which takes place every year across Australia. This year the book was 'Hickory Dickory Dash', an hilarious look at the reason **why** the mouse in the nursery rhyme actually ran up the clock!

We tuned into an online reading from Playschool presenter, Jay Laga'aia. Afterwards, our students enthusiastically drew a picture and wrote a caption of their favourite part of the story. The K-1 students made finger puppets and performed a 'play' for the Year 2 and 3 students to watch. The Year 2 and 3 students made a 'find the mouse chatterbox'.





Some News from the Music Room...

This term in Music class the students have been learning to recognise the notes on the treble clef. In Year 3, this looked like a giant size music staff taped to the floor on which the students could jump out a rhyme to remember the notes. They then collected all the colour coded tuned instruments they could find – boomwackers, chime bars, tuned bells – and placed them on the correct note. Now they could sit in the music staff and play the notes all the way up and down the scale! The students also created their own word rhymes to help them remember the names of the notes and their order. Freya from Room 20 wrote a particularly memorable one – '<u>Every Fashionable G</u>irl <u>A</u>ctually <u>Becomes Creepy During Egg Fights'</u>!





Years 4-6 have begun the process of writing their own folk song, putting it to music and performing it to the class. It is a term-long process that will require all their skills of collaboration, music writing and playing on the ukulele, guitar or piano.
