## Leadership Conference





On Monday 25 March all Beaconsfield Student Leaders attended the 2019 National Young Leaders Day run by the Halogen Group at the Perth Convention and Exhibition Centre.

We had the opportunity to learn from various inspiring speakers. The first speaker Akram Aziri, a lawyer and Indigenous right advocate who was born and raised in Afghanistan during a horrific civil war before emigrating to Australia, taught us an important lesson on leading through inclusion of all people no matter their religion, gender, age or race.

Our second speaker was Jade Slater, the product manager for the Cotton On Foundation. She took us through the journey of selling charity items in their stores to fund their programs that build schools and provide fresh food and clean drinking water to thousands of children in impoverished areas of Uganda, South Sudan, South Africa and Thailand. She spoke on the importance of finding your passion and helping others.

The third speaker was the five-time Olympic gold medallist Leisel Jones who explained the importance of high expectations and goal setting. She broke down the 12 670 hours of training it took her from a young age in order to succeed at the highest level. She also spoke about the need for persistence and resilience in the face of failure.

The final speaker was Matt Cosgrove, the author of many, many books including 'Alpacas with Maracas', the text selected for 2019 National Simultaneous Story Time. He spoke about his journey to becoming an author and illustrator by overcoming setbacks, staying positive and believing in himself until he found the right publisher.

Overall it was an amazing day and the student leaders can agree that we cannot wait to apply what we learnt on Monday both at school and the outside world.
