With **2.7 million** coffee cups being used and discarded every day in Australia, who can blame them?

During this term we are also commencing a **bin blitz at Beacy.** Currently, we recycle all paper and cardboard, as well as comingle recycling. Furthermore, each classroom has a food compost bin, that is then utilised in our worm farm in the Kitchen Garden. All bins are labelled and colour coded, however unfortunately there are items that are ending up in the incorrect bins on a daily basis. 


