Dear Beacy

Thank you to the parents who attended the Parent Reading Workshops presented over the last two weeks by our Literacy Coordinator and Instructional Coach Caz Park. The clinical understandings around how students effectively learn abstract concepts such as reading have progressed significantly since any of us were at school, so we appreciate any opportunity to bring parents up to speed with what we're doing and, most importantly, why we're doing it. Look forward to similar sessions next term on Maths from Mr Oakley.

Last week our community raised over \$1000 in aid of the Turkey-Syria earthquake crisis through the free dress day. Thank you to all who generously gave to such an important cause, and also thanks to Sarah Lechte for organising the event. Our students will have another opportunity to dress up this Thursday for Harmony Day under the theme of 'Everyone Belongs'. Students are invited to wear either their cultural dress or orange to celebrate all the benefits of living in a culturally diverse world. This fortnight's community assembly will be held on the same day due to the Summer Carnival on the Friday. The IEC students from Room 10 and 17 will presenting their assembly item on Thursday as a key part of the Harmony Week theme. Many of our students have been participating in a range of tests over the past two weeks. All pre-primaries have now completed the On-Entry testing, and parents can look forward to reports coming home soon

with information about your child's strengths and future focuses as they start full time school. I have nothing but admiration for the way our Year 3s and 5s have approached the first two NAPLAN tests in the last week. They arrived focused but relaxed as they completed the Writing aspect on Wednesday before finishing the week with the exclusively online Reading assessment.

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NAPLAN continues this week with Language Conventions (spelling and grammar) for all students on Monday before everyone tackles Numeracy on Tuesday. Any students who miss a test will have an opportunity to catch up in small groups with other students in the same boat. The last group going through testing is our Year 6s, many of whom recently sat the first part of the Gifted and Talented Entry (GATE) high school test. It takes enormous courage to even attempt these tests so all participants should be incredibly proud for taking them in the first place. Parents are encouraged to reach out to the school for any assistance we can provide; in the past we've supervised tests on weekends that were missed due to illness, or worked around school events for testing dates that occur on weekdays.

Finally, a note about the half day closure on March 29 for parent-teacher interviews. The normal school day will end at 11:45am on that day, so at that time students can either depart as they normally would or remain at school under modified supervision. If your child does require supervision after 11:45am, please complete the <u>online form</u> to provide the necessary details to assist us in our planning. Please be sure to complete one form for each child so all students are identified correctly.

Many timeslots have already been booked and the remaining sessions are filling fast, so if you haven't already made an appointment with your child's classroom teacher to discuss their progress and achievements so far this year please do so quickly to avoid missing out. Calf 1 and Calf 3 weigh 152 kg.

How heavy is each calf?

Further Challenge: Is there an easier way to find the weights of the three calves?

Can you devise a system of weighing them that is easier to solve, given that the scales can't weigh anything less than 100kg?

Can their weights be found in less than three weighings?


The Harmony Day assembly will be held on Thursday 23 March, not Friday. Students are encouraged to wear familial tradition dress, orange or school uniform (not free dress).

In Term 2, Creative Kids will be inspired to create a variety of nature-based artworks. We will be creating beautiful, macro flowers inspired by American artist, Georgia O'Keeffe. To celebrate Autumn we will be sketching, printing and painting autumn leaves in a mixed media artwork. To complete the term, we will be painting a majestic winter landscape scene, complete with woodland deer on A3 paper.

Art Club will be looking at surrealist painter, Pablo Picasso to create a vibrant Rooster artwork. Students will also be using typography to create a colourful painting where letters are used as shapes to create a layered optical feast on canvas.
