## Year 5s and 6s

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sum of the first and last numbers minus the centre number gives the same answer. Some help to get you started:

| $A$ | $B$ | $C$ |
| :--- | :--- | :--- |
| $D$ | $E$ | $F$ |
| $G$ | $H$ | $I$ |

Let $k=$ the sum of the first and last numbers minus the centre number. Therefore:
$k=A+C-B=\quad G+I-H=A+I-E=$
$\mathrm{D}+\mathrm{F}-\mathrm{E}=\mathrm{A}+\mathrm{G}-\mathrm{D}=\mathrm{C}+\mathrm{I}-\mathrm{F}=\mathrm{C}+\mathrm{G}-\mathrm{E}=$
