Every Day Counts

As we are now into the assessment end of Semester 1, and teachers are working towards completing report cards for students, it is vital that students are here as much as possible so they can show their teachers what they know and can do.

Missing 1 Day equals 5 hours of learning time lost, and this adds up quickly and can place a lot of pressure on students to try and catch this time up. Please also remember to inform the school with a reason if your child is away.

Parent Supervision (Before and After School)

It is great that at Beacy, many families make time to catch up and socialise before and after school. This contributes to the community feel our school has, and as Principal this is something I really value.

The issue is that in too many cases students are not supervised appropriately by parents during these times, and we are managing issues between students and spending school funds on equipment that is being vandalised and damaged by students, out of hours while their parents are in the school grounds.

I spoke to the students about this at assembly so they are clear on the expectations, but I think it's important to make this clear for families so we can all work together on this.

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If parents are at school with their child before 8:30am or after 3pm, parents need to be able to see their children and be accountable for their actions 100% of the time. Students can only be where their parents are. An example will be if a parent is at the Junior Playground, the student can only be there, if the student wants/needs to go to another area, he/she must be accompanied by their parent.

If there are any questions, or if parents require clarification, please do not hesitate to contact me. I want families to be able to continue to see our school as a community, and a place to connect.

Bike Safety Checks

CycleSense will be providing two 'Bike Safety Check' days at school! It is an opportunity to have your child's bike checked by qualified mechanics who will provide a comprehensive bike safety check and basic maintenance to ensure the bike is safe to ride. This is a part of the "Your Move" program we have at Beaconsfield PS. If additional work is required, this will be indicated on the Mechanical Checklist Form that will be attached to each bike after it has been checked.

The mechanics will be located at the Bike Rack Area near the Admin Building from 8:15am onwards this coming Monday May 20 and Monday May 27. Your child will just need to bring their bike to school that day so it can be accessed by the mechanics.

showing the most promise!




