

Celebrating NAIDOC (National Aborigines and Islanders Day Observance Committee) Week through art in our school brings so many benefits for our students and community. Drawing, painting and 'making" are practical ways for students to learn about the rich cultural heritage of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, and to develop a deeper understanding and appreciation of this country.

We learnt about Aboriginal uses of fire over 40 000 years in Australia. We discussed land management, harvesting, medicine, science and technology, cooking, art, ceremony, as well as fire's central role in gathering and connecting people. It was a great opportunity to encourage critical thinking and reflection on historical and

contemporary issues: Fire is deeply embedded in Aboriginal culture and shaping this country.

builds empathy and respect among students for Indigenous experiences and perspectives, fostering a sense of community. We hope these hands-on projects provide memorable learning experiences and opportunities for students to showcase their artistic talents, boosting their confidence and pride.
