FROM THE PRINCIPAL

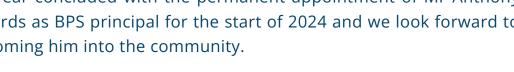
2023 saw another incredibly positive and constructive year for the staff, students and families of Beaconsfield PS. We welcomed a significant number of new families to the school, predominately through the Intensive English Centre (IEC) which grew to almost 70 students in four classes from 41 different countries. We also welcomed several new staff members as our student numbers swelled past 550.

We saw steady progress in student outcomes due to a continued focus on established practices and programs. A particular achievemtn was the school exceeding expectations in our Public School Review follow up evaluation on Student Achievement and Progress in Term 3. Our grounds and infrastructure saw significant upgrades, primarily in the forms of the refurbishment of the Undercover Area and a new transportable classroom on site. Two more classroom are scheduled to be installed in 2024 to accomodate the influx of both mainstream and IEC numbers.

Our P&C again worked tirelessly to provide opportunties for the community to come together to celebrate our school and raise funds towards shared improvement initiatives. A special word of thanks to outgoing executive members Prue Riley, David Spencer and Holly Kemp for their leadership over the last few productive years.

Another special mention to our outgoing Board Chair Dan Coffey who has served in the role since 2022. Dan's support and guidance in the school's governance processes has been invaluable over the past two years. The 2024 - 2026 Business Plan produced through consultation with the Board and staff is evidence of a highly productive and constructive period in the school's history.

The year concluded with the permanent appointment of Mr Anthony Edwards as BPS principal for the start of 2024 and we look forward to welcoming him into the community.

TEACHING & LEARNING

The teaching and learning focus in focused primarily on developing the school's Explicit Teaching Framework. This approach lays out the explicit learning intention, evaluation practices and guided support present in each lesson that delivers the desired student progress in all learning areas across the school. Staff engaged in peer observations and coaching sessions where they built on their skills by sharing successes and challenges with different parts of the framework.

Our aim in Literacy in 2023 was to continue to develop consistency in the content and quality of our whole school programs. Our synthetic phonics and upper primary spelling programs continued to be collaboratively refined in the aim of equipping students with the sound and letter coding skills required to both interpret and create meaning with the written word. Year 2-6 staff continued to develop proficiency in Talk4Reading and Talk4Writing, a program that emphasizes exposing all students in the class to high quality literature and using acquired tools to deconstruct the meaning within to range of levels.

Additive thinking, focusing on flexibility and mastery when working with numbers in either concrete, pictorial or abstract form, continued to be a focus in Mathematics. This approach focuses on students developing a wide range of skills and strategies they can

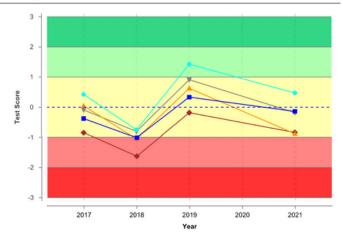
independently apply dependent on problem content and complexity. Weekly events such as Numero Club provided opportunities for students to further develop their skills. HASS, Science, Technologies and Health lessons gave students the chance to engage in the world beyond their classroom, while they experimented and expressed themselves through our specialist subjects in Visual Art, Music, Physical Education and Italian.



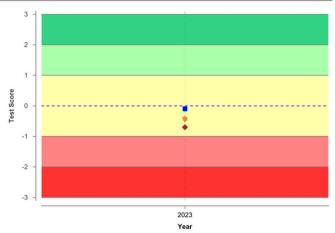
STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT AND PROGRESS

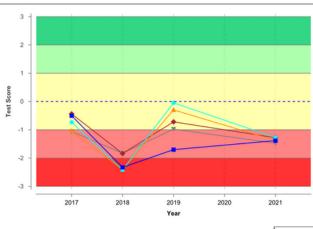
Comparative Performance: Year 3



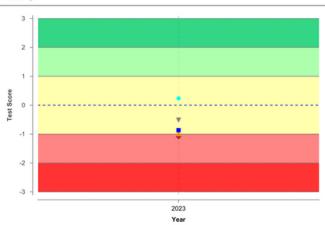


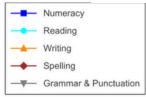

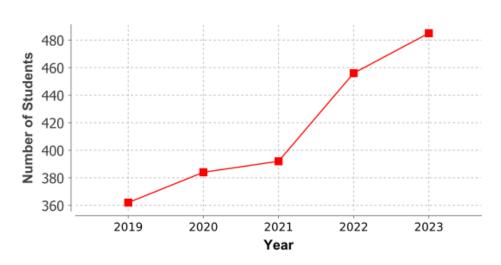

2023 enrolment figures show a continued rise in both mainstream and IEC enrolments as seen in previous years. With two new transportables arriving before the 2024 school year is expected that enrolments will exceed 550 full time students before the Semester 1 census.

While attendance rates have improved since the COVID-19-affected years of 2020 and 2022, both the ovarall attendance and regular attendee rate has not yet returned to that of like schools. The frequency of families travelling to see relatives overseas for extended periods accounted for 4% of absences in 2023, a figure that will drop as normal operations resume across the world.

Semester 2 Student Numbers



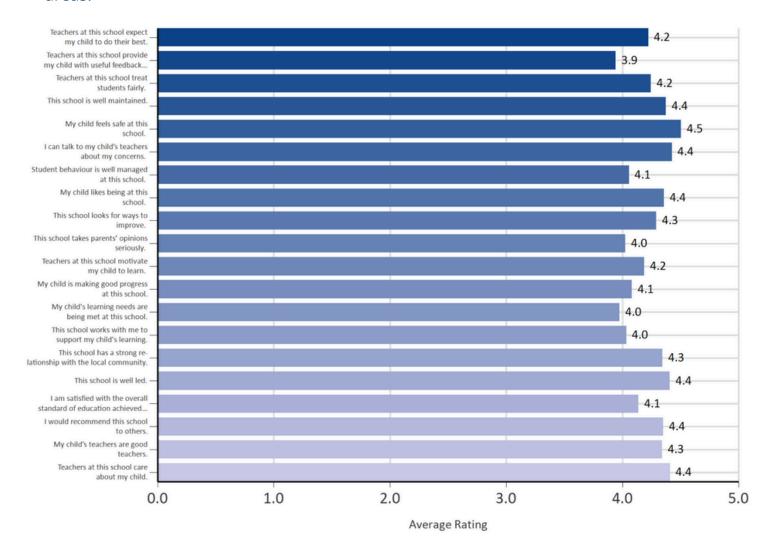

2023 PARENT SURVEY

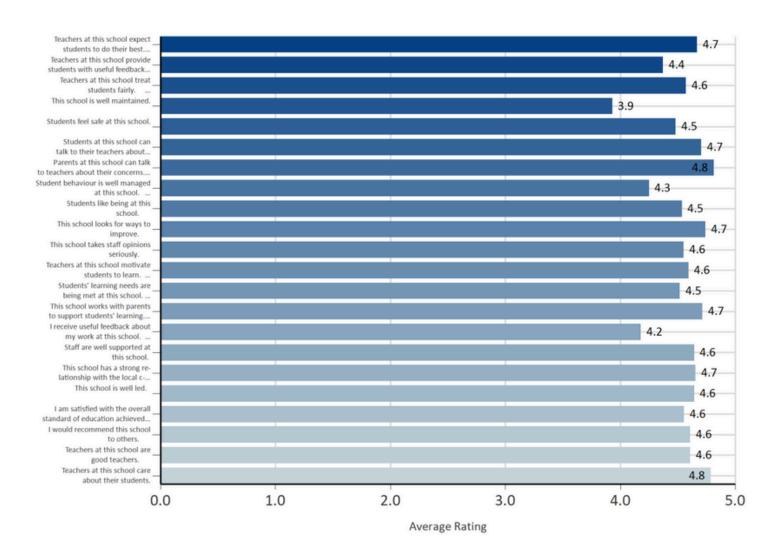
The following three school opinion surveys were conducted in Term 4 2023.

The parent survey below is an aggregated result of 123 responses from across the whole school. The numerical results demonstrate a continued high level of trust and engagement in the school's core business of improving studnet outcomes, with the comments section containing many affirmations about school operations, communication and leadership. The themes arising in constructive feedback centred around accessibility, improving particular areas of the grounds, year-to-year consistency in teaching and learning, and the school's capacity to house all students in the intake areas.



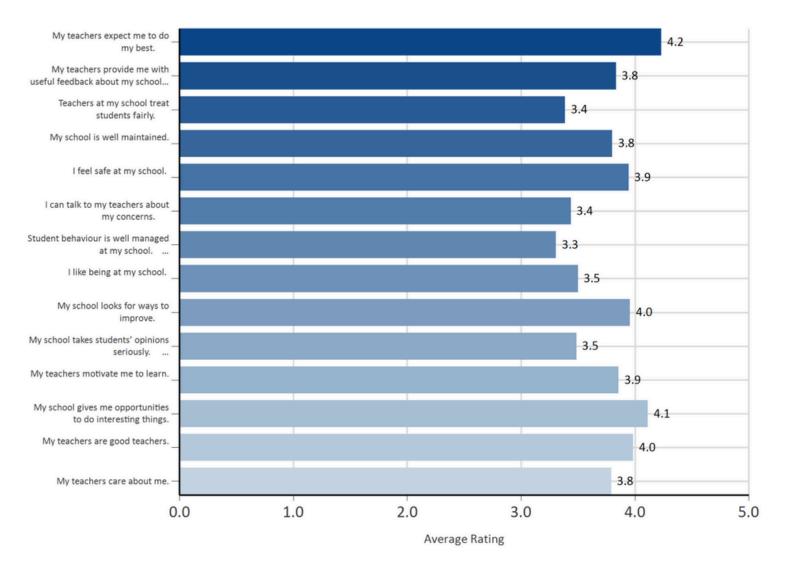
2023 STAFF SURVEY

The numerical results reflect a strategic apporach to building trust and collegiality through the school's core business of improving studnet outcomes, with the comments section containing many affirmations about school support, opportunities for development and collegiality. The themes arising in workload and system demands were evident in the constructive responses.



2023 STUDENT SURVEY

The student survey below is an aggregated result of 73 responses from students in Year 4-6. Compared to previous years, the scores demonstrate an improved vstudents' view of their learning while recognising the efforts of their teachers and other staff. Students value the "feel" off the school represented by their friends and the tone of the school, many acknowledging the many forms of recognition for positive behaviour present in their school. The majority of constructive comments requested an increase in material items such as the number of devices available, more playgrounds and more equipment in general.
