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Absence Messaging System

This week, I sent communication in relation to the importance of informing the school of your child's absence. It has since been brought to my attention that there are some mixed messages about how this is to be done by parents in order for the message to get to the right place.

Some parents inform the class teacher. This is a great thing to do as a matter of courtesy, but for a range of reasons this message does not always get to the front office in time to meet our safety and legislative requirements.

All parents should have received a text message with a phone number to save. If you text this number with the details of your child's absence, it will go directly to our school system and will be picked up by our front office team. This is easiest way for parents to inform the school of an absence.

Below are ways to inform the school of your child's absence from now on:

Parents are still encouraged to notify their child's teacher as a matter of courtesy. I am aware that Connect has the function of notifying of an absence, however this seems to be unreliable at times, and not our preferred option.

Thank you so much to all our parents for getting on board with this. We have gone from more than 40 unexplained absences in a day to less than 5 and sometimes none already. I am aware that from time to time our systems will fail, but this is a really great start to this new way of working.

Before School for Students and Parents

There has been some discussion about expectations before 8:30pm between myself and parents. In the past I have said to students that there are no competitive games before school (even if your parents are here) this was put in place because games may start with parents, but then other students join in that do not have parent supervision, and in some cases parents may leave before 8:30 leaving multiple students playing unsupervised, when unsupervised students need to be at the admin courtyard before 8:30am.

I want to be let parents know that I have no intention of involving myself in what parents do with their own children before 8:30am. If you are directly with your child and engaged in an activity with them, that is completely your decision as a parent, and I do not want to control this.

My only expectation is that parents are engaged with and supervising their own children, and competitive games do not occur before 8:30am with simply a parent watching from a distance, I would prefer it if parents were actively engaging and supervising.

Also, the under covered area can't be used by families before and after school as this is licenced to OSHC, and they need open

access to this area if they chose to use it. Feel free to contact me if you need any clarification.

Our student leaders loved welcoming families into the school today. 
PBS Update



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
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Art news





This year, our senior students have been working hard to develop both their visual and descriptive language skills in art. They are exploring the key elements of art; line, shape, colour, texture, space, form and value, to better understand how these can be used to create meaning in their work. This also helps them notice and appreciate the world around them, as they start to see the art in everyday life. Art is often described as the language of the soul, and by developing these skills, students are better able to understand, express, and describe their inner thoughts and feelings.



Alongside this, the students have been learning some useful techniques, including technical drawing skills like one-point perspective. This skill helps them create the illusion of depth and space in their artwork, making flat images look three-dimensional. It's been wonderful watching

them develop these skills and see the magic of their work coming to life.

I encourage families to ask the students about what they've learned and to have them explain how they see these elements in everyday life.

Our whole school is participating in a special art project centred around the theme of Harmony. Every student will contribute to the larger piece, reflecting this year's theme: "We all have a role to play." In our discussions, we've explored how harmony begins with the individual and how each of us can make a positive impact. The artwork will symbolize this ripple effect, starting with home and then extending school. into communities, our country, and eventually the world.

The students' work will come together to create a powerful visual representation and daily reminder of how we can all contribute to making the world a more harmonious place. We can't wait to share the final project with everyone!
